To own a gun or not to own a gun?

Canadians have long prided themselves on living in a law-abiding society where violence is not a constant threat. Now they wonder. A series of fatal shootings over recent years has aroused the fears that Canada may be going America's way, not least America's ways with guns.

A coalition of Gun Control, backed by police, legal, educational; health, local government and women's groups, has campaigned strongly for tighter controls. But Canada has its own gun lobby. Over the past couple of months, the National Firearms Association, (NFA) has united hunters, target shooters and collectors in protest rallies. A demonstration by 5,000 outside parliament in Ottawa told the Minister of Justice to, target criminals, not gun owners'. The gun lobby bas bombarded rural members of parliament with letters, faxes and threats of ballot revenge.



Laws were strengthened after the massacre of 14 women students at the University of Montreal by a nutter with an assault rifle in 1989. New types of weapons were restricted or prohibited, new requirements added for obtaining gun permit. But the political opposition prevented the Conservative government of the day from going as far as many Canadians wanted. Since then, further murders and random shootings of policemen, shopkeepers, even a youth in a parking lot- dispute, have kept concern at high pitch.

Already, all would - be owners must be scrutinised and take a safety course. Deadly automatic weapons are prohibited. Ownership of hand guns and semi-automatic weapons is subject to tight restriction and registration. Ordinary rifles and short guns are not subject to registration, but ail firearms must be stored safely. Even so, Canadians own around 6 million guns, about 1 million of them handguns.

Mr Rock is convinced that guns will be used less in crime if they are less available. His reforms as he has outlined them, may include: tougher measures on gun smuggling, tougher penalties for that, for illegal possessions of guns and for their use in crimes; new strict controls on the sale of ammunition, prohibition of replicas; tighter restrictions - even possibly a complete ban- on hand guns and semiautomatic weapons.

What the gun lobby is against, is the requirement to register guns. Many people in rural areas own rifles and short guns for hunting- to protect themselves at times against bears. There is need for tougher crime controls, not gun control, say the protesters. They argue that registration would be ineffective, costly and a bureaucratic intrusion into their freedom. They further argue that they have a' right to bear arms' and need them for self defence against criminals.

Statistics challenge the public belief that gun- related crime is out of control. Guns are responsible for 32% of homicides- as they have in each year in the past decade. Canada had 193 such cases last year (about one-sixth as many), relative to population, as the United States. Robbery with firearms consistently averages about 27% of ail robberies. There has been a nasty rise in the use of bandguns, however.

Whatever the figures, most Canadians strongly favour tougher controls. A poll a year ago found 86% for a ban on the assault weapons, and 71% who would ban all hand guns too. Yet Mr Rock faces a tough fight to get his reforms through. Particularly parliamentarians from the rural constituencies support the gun lobby.
